#### **Course Description**

This is the Summer Mentoring Fellowship: "Health Access: Maternal Health in Black American Communities" and follows the same Fellowship description accepted by UCF Graduate Studies.

During the Summer Mentoring Fellowship student works on Phase I of dissertation research. This includes comprehensive literature review in order to develop strong research questions and project design that will integrate qualitative and quantitative data (mixed-methods) collection. It will also involve the collection and analysis of statistical health data provided by the Florida Health Department, and then mapping of potential research sites based on locations where maternal health outcomes are most problematic.

Description and goals for the Fellowship for Phase I of PhD research include:

- 1. Comprehensive scientific literature review and annotated bibliography (10 hours/week)
- 2. The mapping of potential research sites based on statistical and demographic health data in Florida (5 hours/week)
- 3. The development of a mixed-methods research design (5 hours/week)

4. Completion of the CITI Certification for Research with Human Subjects (5 hours total)

#### **Student Learning Outcomes/Course Objectives**

- 1. Student learns about existing scientific literature review and does an annotated bibliography
- 2. Student learns about potential research sites
- 3. Student learns mixed-methods research design
- 4. Student learns about ethics in Research with Human Subjects
