Objectives:

- 1. Understand the role of plants in various ethnic cuisines.
- 2. Learn the vocabulary related to plants and their products as used in meal preparations.
- 3. Explore the scientific connections between plant-based food and nutrition.
- **4.** Develop research techniques focusing on the current trends in food, health & society.

Test / Quiz/ Exam policy:

*Students who show up late (more than 5 minutes after the scheduled start) for any of the above tests/ exams will be marked absent. You must have a valid UCF student ID in your possession to enter the exam room.

Graded exams: Exams will be either hand- or machine graded. Grades will be returned in class. Direct any questions regarding the grades to the instructor on the same day. Tests will be available for review at Dr.Rani's office for two weeks after each test. Only one exam will be available for review at one time. Feedback & Grade concerns:

- Test answers will not be released; however, feedback will be given during the next class meeting only after the entire class has completed the test.

Makeup Policy

If you miss a scheduled test, inform me by 5 PM on that day and provide a valid, documented excuse (from the doctor, police, judge, official UCF event, etc.) by Friday following the test date. With the approved reason, a makeup will be arranged at a mutually convenient time. Makeup will be of a different format as lab test set-up cannot be recreated due to time, staff, and place issues. It is the student's responsibility to initiate the request and follow through the make-up exam instructions. Excuses presented orally or through email will not be considered as valid excuses unless supplemented by an official, dated document.

There is NO MAKE-UP for a missed quiz and there is a grade penalty for a late submission.

Laboratory exercises:

- No lab manual is required. The instructor will be providing custom-generated labs. Report submissions are through Webcourses.
- You will be supplied with fresh or dried edible plant product samples for lab work.
- Labs are designed to go along with lecture content. Keep your lecture notes and required course materials with you for all labs.
- A few labs are going to be "on your own". Guidelines will be provided. To make sure that you don't lose points, consider every lab exercise as important and worthy of your attention.
- You are solely responsible for managing your health and safety conditions, especially when trying to prepare/taste food preparations.
- You are expected to abide by the lab rules that are posted on the door. Wear gloves and a mask when handling plant food samples.
- If you plan to bring cooked food samples to share with the class, list every ingredient in the dish. No animal products including, but not limited to milk and butter, are allowed.
- Missed labs cannot be repeated and will not receive any grades unless the absence is University-related or health-related. Valid documentation may be required.
- Students are expected to be present and participate in every lab demonstration.
- Students should contact their instructor(s) as soon as possible if they miss a lab for any illness reason to discuss reasonable adjustments that might need to be made.

- Gathering to take an online quiz or test with others and sharing answers in the process is considered academic misconduct.

If a student or group of students are found to be exchanging material associated with a graded assignment, quiz, or test through any form of technology (GroupMe, WhatsApp, etc.), or use outside assistance (Googling answers, use of websites such as Quizlet, Course Hero, Chegg Study, etc.), they could receive anywhere from a zero grade on the exercise to an "F" in the course depending on the act.
