To acquire integrative experiences from internships, interviews, research experiences, ePortfolios to help build career readiness or apply for higher studies.

Attention Plant Science Students:

This course requires you to demonstrate leadership, exhibit teamwork ability, problem-solving skills, communication, and interpersonal skills.

This course is designed with guidelines and training opportunities to help you reach your career or academic goals.

- To help with the mastery of fundamental botanical skills which are useful in plant-related professions.

Objectives:

- Identify potential jobs/career paths of interest that you can obtain with a B.S. in Biology Plant Science (BPS)
- Locate service learning, internship, and research opportunities around the campus location
- Know the application requirements for applying to graduate school with BPS
- Review core concepts of Plant Science
- Prepare an ePortfolio to identify and sharpen your skill sets.

Plant Science Learning Outcome Quizzes

The Quiz questions are compiled from your previous course materials, so mastery of all of your previous (or currently enrolled) plant course content is important. The essential content is determined by the learning objectives of your previous courses.

Grading scale:

The following scale will be used to convert a numerical grade into a letter grade. That is,

85% and above = A 75% - <85% = B 65% - <75% = C 55% - <65% = D 54% and below = F

Grading- In accordance with university policy an "A" grade is given only for excellent work, a "B" grade only for good work, a "C" grade is given for standard work, a "D" grade is given for substandard work, and an "F" grade is failure.

Z designation:

Incomplete Grade:

Each graded assignment will have ample duration for submission (anywhere from 24 hours to one to two weeks) depending on the intensity of the work that is required. For this reason, do NOT expect an extension for your submission deadline.

If you anticipate missing a scheduled assignment due to university/government-related reasons, reach out to me a week in advance. The assignment submission date can be adjusted for this reason.

For all other reasons for missing a scheduled submission, students must email the instructor ASAP by the end of the day. A grade penalty of 10% will be applied for every late submission up to 24 hours unless your reason is supported with a valid, documented reason that should be submitted along with your late request.

A student can have a maximum of one late submission (up to 24 hours late) for the entire semester. A second late assignment will have a grade penalty of 25%; a third late assignment with a 50% grade penalty.

- The use of outside assistance from another person/student or by searching the internet, googling for answers, use of websites such as Quizlet, Course Hero, Chegg Study, etc. is considered academic misconduct.
- Gathering to take an online quiz or test with others and sharing answers in the process is considered academic misconduct.

If a student or group of students are found to be exchanging material associated with a graded assignment, quiz, or test through any form of technology (GroupMe, WhatsApp, etc.), or use outside assistance (Googling answers, use of websites such as Quizlet, Course Hero, ChatGPT, Chegg Study, etc.), they could receive anywhere from a zero grade on the exercise to an "F" in the course depending on the act.
